Can CME Reduce Costs?

Last month we pointed to a survey supporting CME for outcomes in practice improvement. This month a second survey conducted by Global Education Group of 1500 physicians looked at the cost-efficiencies of CME. Twenty-nine percent of respondents indicated that CME gave them knowledge that enabled them to consider more cost effective treatment options and had resulted in fewer patient follow-up visits and or less consult time. Respondents indicated they learned how to better manage their patients which resulted in patients improving their adherence to recommended treatments. Specifically, respondents said CME helped them avoid unnecessary and/or ineffective drug therapies; choose the most effective drug for their formulary instead of having to supply multiple drugs of the same class and reduce the number of colonoscopy tests by following guidelines they learned.

This new data adds to the pile of evidence that CME does, in fact, help physicians do their jobs better which in turn improves outcomes and lower costs. Having qualitative and quantitative data bodes well for the future of CME.

Just a Number

With the addition of St. Luke's Magic Valley, ACMEC is now tracking around 1900 physicians, PA's and NP's. These are all dues paying members of the medical staffs of the hospitals in Treasure Valley, Eastern Oregon and Southwestern Idaho. As we attempt to manage the database for such a large group it has never been more important to have accurate information when signing in on your attendance at a conference. Our database entry can require looking at as many as 10 lists on credentialed staff in order to verify one entry.

Mohr's Musings...

Listening

A leading complaint against physicians in many polls is "my doctor doesn't listen to me". Why is this so and what can be done about it?

Because of changes in healthcare delivery such as a dependence on technology and a decline in patient encounter times which reflects the reality of reimbursement, listening has become an endangered species.

Time is the "gift" we all have to share with our patients; though we barely have enough of it to finish the tasks we must, much less those we would like.

Listening may enhance one's diagnostic accuracy but for many it is not easy. It is a skill that can be improved. It sometimes requires us not to be in control but when done empathically it enhances patient communication and shows our caring and concern. It may also give us the diagnosis.

Listening should be done in a comfortable environment without external interruptions such as cell phones and pagers. Eye contact at the patient's level is essential. External concerns should be put aside so that the patient is our primary focus. Open ended questions may be helpful as are some non-medical questions. Repeating two or three words from the patients last sentence is a technique that assures the patient we are listening. Silence from the physician can be a powerful form of non-verbal communication. Resist the temptation to change the subject or to offer advice too soon. When we listen to patients we reassure them that their lives have meaning and we strengthen the physician/patient relationship.
